

Qualifying for Title I Services



What is Title I?

Title I is a federal assistance program for schools that provides additional academic support for students. The goal of Title I is to help every child meet the academic standards and get a high quality education. Title I provides millions of children with the help they need to be successful in school.

- Children do better in school and feel better about themselves.

- Child's school- ask if you can borrow materials.

Read to your child:

- Even if he/she can already read, talk about the story; ask what might happen next.
